Honeywell Arts Academy

Each year the caliber of students participating in the program has raised the bar on excellence and the world is noticing

Honeywell Arts Academy is a full scholarship summer program for emerging artists taking place annually in Wabash, IN. This intensive retreat-like experience creates a fertile environment for a concept that was born here called the sharing of knowledge. The sharing of knowledge breaks down traditional barriers of the student-to-teacher hierarchy and allows for all to be equal in sharing ideas. The industry knowledge from our world-class faculty play an integral role in the success of our fellowship scholars.

The Academy is comprised of three programs all based around the sharing of knowledge; Resonance Institute, Soundboard Institute, and Wabass Institute. Resonance for the multifaceted musician brings classically trained musicians of any instrument together into a melting pot of inspiration and collaboration. Each season is more unique than the next with the

fluidity of the instrumentation. Soundboard for pianists provides an opportunity for pianists to get out of the practice room and fosters their growth as a community. Pianists are often solitary with their practice and performance, but Soundboard allows them to come together through camaraderie versus competition. Wabass for double bassists is the oldest of the three programs, and is the starting point to what the Academy has grown into today. 95% of Wabass alumni are professional musicians throughout the globe sharing their music.

Past Academy attendees can now be seen on stages across the globe, but lucky patrons have the opportunity to see them in Wabash before they hit the world stage. While some may think an esteemed Academy like this would likely take place in New York or Los Angeles, make no mistake that the perfect location is Wabash.

How so? Wabash provides the perfect location for scholars and faculty to fully immerse themselves. They do so through the structure of the Academy itself – but also because of the community nature of the program. Scholars live in Wabash, walk to and from Eagles Theatre for sessions, share meals together – and, oh yes, are typically very fond of local establishments (Modoc's, anyone?). The small-town setting allows scholars and faculty to connect, share and hone their skills in a most conducive way.

Mark your calendars for the 2023 Honeywell Arts Academy. Patrons will not only be blown away by the talent, they will be treated to truly one-of-a-kind performances. Scholars do not merely perform. In a matter of days, they collaborate with musicians who they have never met before to create music and artistry that was unimaginable before the Academy began. Patrons then will have the opportunity to meet

What isn't as much of a secret, is our running crew's obsession with long morning workouts which usually makes justifying the extra calories quite easy.

After one of these calorie burning mornings this year, we decided to make our way through Wabash County to try all of the tasty, sweet and savory handheld treats. We wanted to ensure that we knew the ins and outs on where we could satisfy our sweet cravings. After finishing a long run (and big calorie burn), we took off from the Wabash YMCA and pointed our car north on Cass Street, in search of great sweetness.

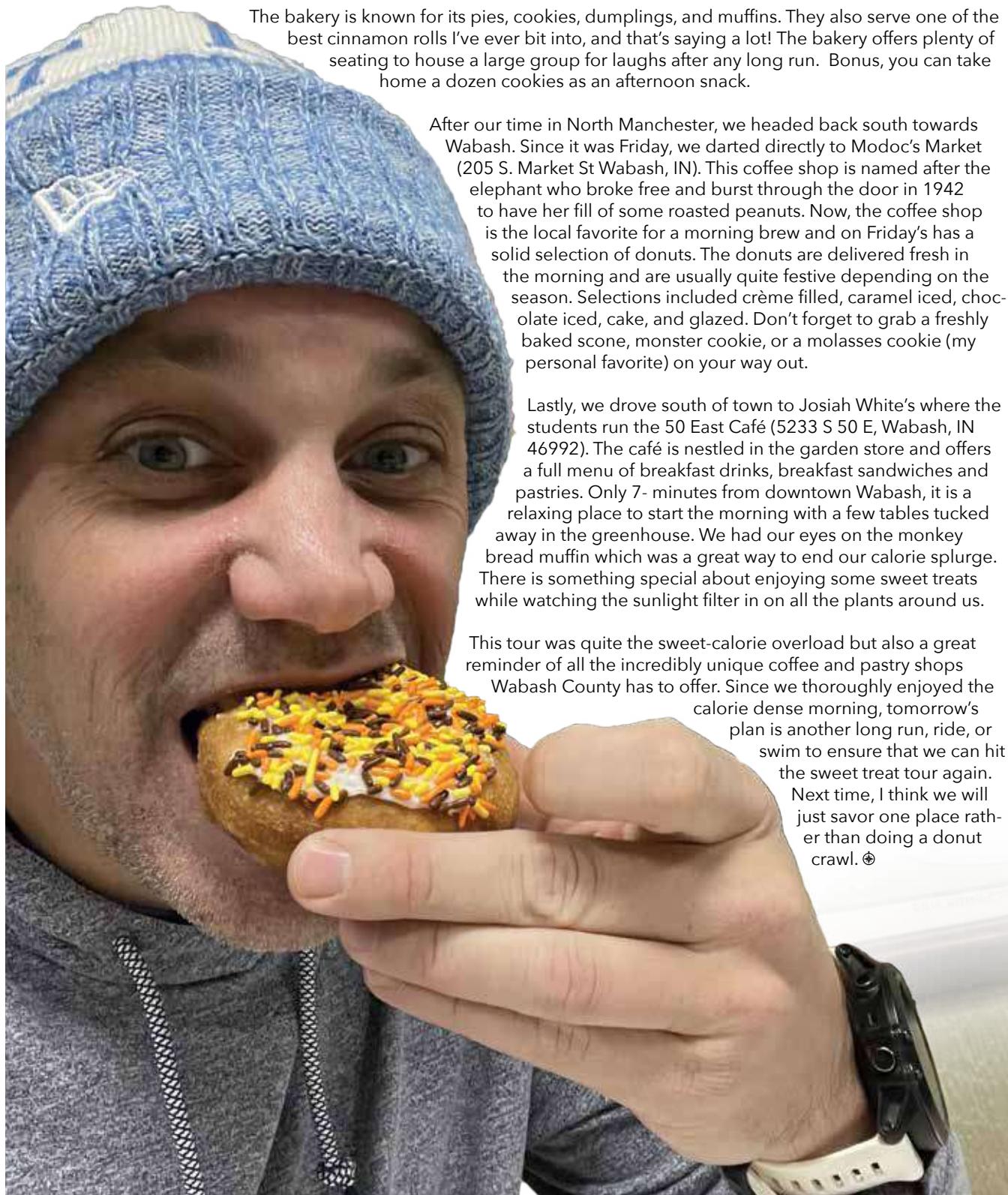
Our first spot was Mike & Roxy's Donut Shop. Located at 1146 N Cass St in Wabash, this quaint donut shop popped onto the scene in the midst of COVID and drew a crowd by offering "Wabash Donuts." Mike, the owner, was there with a friendly smile and plenty of fresh, colorful donuts. The nostalgic donuts once were made here in Wabash but now are delivered fresh each morning by the same original bakers. We found a slew of delicious options from fruit fritters, crème-filled, glazed, cake, twists... you name it. It was a great start to our morning tour.

Next, we continued north towards North Manchester to see what the northside of the county had to offer. Next stop, KenapocoMocha Coffee & Pastries. Walking into the historic house just off Main Street (101 E Second St. North Manchester) the smells of sweet deliciousness filled the air in the best way! Our attention drifted to the array of coffee and specialty drinks along with several house-made pastries. The atmosphere is unique, quaint, yet secluded just enough to ensure your catch-up with a close friend or business colleague is highly productive. K-Mo takes pride in being farm-to-fork and eco-friendly while serving a solidly sweet pastry.

While in North Manchester, we also stopped at Nordmann's Nook Bakery located directly on Main Street (1106 IN-114 W North Manchester). This nostalgic spot has all the delicious smells of my grandma's house.

The bakery is known for its pies, cookies, dumplings, and muffins. They also serve one of the best cinnamon rolls I've ever bit into, and that's saying a lot! The bakery offers plenty of seating to house a large group for laughs after any long run. Bonus, you can take home a dozen cookies as an afternoon snack.

After our time in North Manchester, we headed back south towards Wabash. Since it was Friday, we darted directly to Modoc's Market (205 S. Market St Wabash, IN). This coffee shop is named after the elephant who broke free and burst through the door in 1942 to have her fill of some roasted peanuts. Now, the coffee shop is the local favorite for a morning brew and on Friday's has a solid selection of donuts. The donuts are delivered fresh in the morning and are usually quite festive depending on the season. Selections included crème filled, caramel iced, chocolate iced, cake, and glazed. Don't forget to grab a freshly baked scone, monster cookie, or a molasses cookie (my personal favorite) on your way out.

Lastly, we drove south of town to Josiah White's where the students run the 50 East Café (5233 S 50 E, Wabash, IN 46992). The café is nestled in the garden store and offers a full menu of breakfast drinks, breakfast sandwiches and pastries. Only 7- minutes from downtown Wabash, it is a relaxing place to start the morning with a few tables tucked away in the greenhouse. We had our eyes on the monkey bread muffin which was a great way to end our calorie splurge. There is something special about enjoying some sweet treats while watching the sunlight filter in on all the plants around us.

This tour was quite the sweet-calorie overload but also a great reminder of all the incredibly unique coffee and pastry shops Wabash County has to offer. Since we thoroughly enjoyed the calorie dense morning, tomorrow's plan is another long run, ride, or swim to ensure that we can hit the sweet treat tour again. Next time, I think we will just savor one place rather than doing a donut crawl. ☺

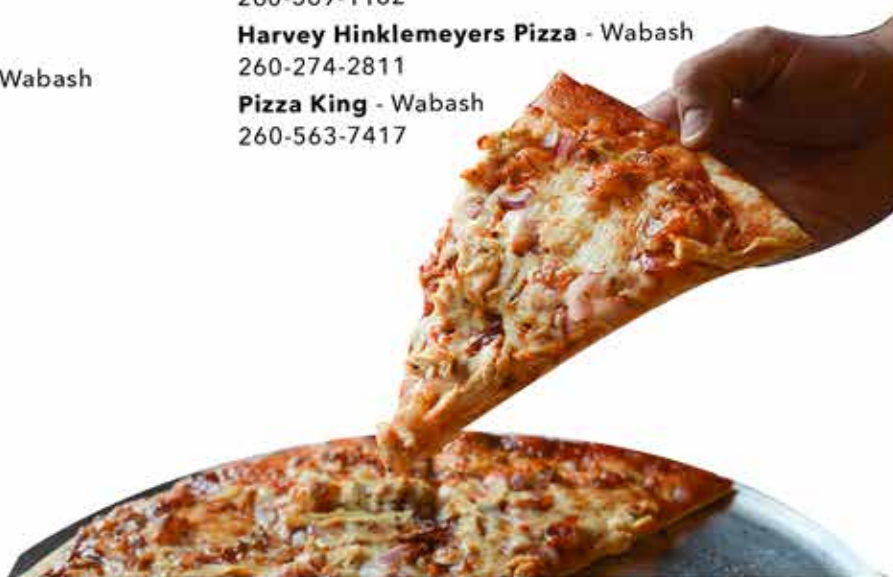

PRESERVING THE PAST, EDUCATING THE FUTURE

On March 27, 1906, the Fraternal Order of Eagles brought the five-story theatre on Market Street to life. Originally the building's first floor was the home of vaudeville shows which traveled from town to town via train. The top floor housed a lodge hall and other floors were used for offices and meetings. The golden age of vaudeville was short-lived, and soon, Eagles Theatre began new life as a single screen movie venue. Many generations grew up attending Saturday matinees with a box of candy in one hand and perhaps picking gum off the seat in front of you with the other. Even then the Eagles Theatre had immense character.

In 2010, the Honeywell Foundation acquired the historic Eagles Theatre which had seen little investment over the years hence the gum under the seats. The Foundation immediately went to work to invest in necessary upgrades to enhance customer experience. In 2017, the Honeywell Foundation closed the theatre to embark on a \$16 million restoration that would not only bring the theatre back to life but provide it with 21st century amenities and technology. The two-year transformation touched all 30,000 square feet of the building, including expanding the lobby and reconfiguring the auditorium and stage to accommodate both movies and live performances. Other modernizations include new accessible restrooms, a state-of-the-art sound system, carpet and wall treatments that reflect the theatre's original patterns and motifs.



Floor two of the building is now a host of tremendous opportunities for the community. The Media Arts program housed on the second floor provides area high school students the ability to gain hands-on experience in audio and video production for careers in media-related industries. The third floor holds meeting rooms and classrooms and provides access to balcony suites that can be rented for private events or VIP-level views of shows in the main theatre. The fourth-floor ballroom, believed to have held its last event in the 1940s, was a virtual time capsule, with remnants of hand-painted ceilings hinting at earlier opulence. Local artists carefully photographed and re-created the ceiling artwork over several months, helping return the ballroom to its former grandeur.

The theatre was reopened on February 29, 2020, with a performance by hometown music star, Crystal Gayle. Just a few days later, Eagles was shuttered due to the pandemic. Eagles is now fully open sharing its sophistication and charm with all who attend. This year alone the theatre has seen performances by the Honeywell Arts Academy, 23 live shows and regular movie showings.

The perseverance and hard work by the Honeywell Foundation on the transformation of the Eagles Theatre was recognized by Indiana Landmarks in 2022 as the winner of the prestigious Cook Cup. This award is given to a project which has followed the highest standards of restoration in transforming a significant historic building, with positive impact on the neighborhood and community. The award is named after The Cook family, who is nationally recognized for their many restorations of significant landmarks in Bloomington and throughout southern Indiana.

The Wabash community is so fortunate to have two Cook Cup Award winners located across the street from each other. The other being the Charley Creek Inn which accepted the award in 2011. These two transformed venues are pillars the community which will provide spaces to celebrate and collaborate for years to come! ☺

Economic Impact of Tourism in Wabash County

In the 1970s, The Francis Shoppe owner Terri Francis-Ahlfeld observed that downtown Wabash, like other rural downtowns, was dying. City and suburban malls were all the rage, so she decided to market in Fort Wayne.

"I thought if Wabash can go to Fort Wayne to shop, then I can go to Fort Wayne and introduce myself and let them know the service that I have," she says. That service was, and is, providing classy special occasion dresses and women's apparel, along with tailoring. "I started going to all the bridal fairs; I started going to Tapestry; I started going to Fort Wayne magazine's bridal fair at the Grand Wayne Center, and all of a sudden they started recognizing me," says Francis-Ahlfeld.

Her urban outreach paid off, because now, Fort Wayne comes to her. "If I have 10 customers in a day who will walk through my front door, nine of them are from Fort Wayne," she says.

The Francis Shoppe is not alone in attracting out-of-area customers. In 2020, visitors to Wabash County spent \$55.8 million, which generated \$5.2 million in state and local taxes. Outside retail spending, accounting for more than \$18 million, was responsible for about one-third of total visitor spending. Forty-three cents of every dollar spent stayed in the county. This data comes from an Economic Impact of Tourism report conducted by Rockport Analytics for Visit Wabash County and the State of Indiana.

Outside money is essential for the economy of Wabash and Wabash County, says Christine Flohr, Executive Director of Tourism for Visit Wabash County. "You have to have enough population to sustain small businesses—that's just the way it is," says Flohr, citing Wabash's population of approximately 10,000 and Wabash County's population of about 31,000.

Since people in the city and county alone do not provide an adequate customer base for local businesses, visitors are essential. Visitors also help reduce property taxes. "If it weren't for tourism dollars spent in 2020 (the year of the most recent economic report) in Wabash County, residents or households would have had to pay an additional \$400 per year in taxes to retain our current tax levels for state and local services, which is key," Flohr says. "Visitors generate sales totaling about \$24 million. That's a benefit to a broad array of local businesses."

Maria Smyth, who co-owns, with her husband, Eclectic Shoppe, a store in downtown Wabash, echoes this sentiment. She sells vintage items, antiques, decor, and local artisanal products.

"There are more than 10,000 residents here in Wabash, so 10,000 people can't really support the whole downtown," she says. Smyth says that Wabash attractions such as the Honeywell Center bring in visitors who want to shop at local stores. Many of these people want to buy something to help them remember their time in Wabash.

"Visitors are looking for souvenirs; they're looking for little things that maybe say 'Wabash' or the 'Midwest,'" says Smyth. "People love that stuff."

Numerous items sold at the Eclectic Shoppe are made by local artisans from Wabash and the immediate surrounding area. Not only does this keep money local; it also adds to a sense of place.

"We've filled this niche market, so I feel like we are part of that downtown heartbeat," Smyth says.

Rhinestones & Roses, a North Manchester florist and women's clothing boutique, sells flowers to students going to Homestead High School (Fort Wayne) prom and to brides from Fort Wayne, Indianapolis, and beyond. Their blooms have even gone to Mackinac Island.

"We use unique and more exotic blooms when we're designing, so we're not a traditional florist," says Jentri Cripe, who runs the shop with her sister, Josi Lambert. This unique niche has helped Rhinestones & Roses carve a customer base well beyond Wabash County. "It's kind of cool to get people from out of town, being from such a small community," Cripe says. "We really have had to market outside of our town alone, really, I would say to make it."

At least half of Rhinestones & Roses' business comes from out of town, says Cripe—a significant number of customers come from Fort Wayne, Warsaw, Akron, Columbia City, and Huntington. She says that business has increased by about 20 percent each year, even during the pandemic year of 2020, because of the shop's broad reach. The store is prospering so much that they opened a location in Fort Wayne.

"Having the support that we've had just says something special about doing business in a small town," she says. "It has surpassed every expectation, starting in a small town and getting people from everywhere to come and visit. They don't just come and shop at our store. They ask, 'Where's your favorite coffee shop? Where's your favorite place to get ice cream? Where can we eat? Where are other places to shop?' That's really what we try to do—get people to come from out of town, out of state, and really make it (North Manchester) a destination."

Ultimately, says Flohr, everything starts with a visit, and the opportunity to bring more visitors to shop and experience Wabash County is the opportunity for more people to discover what Northeast Indiana has to offer and build a life here. "That's a role that tourism plays," Flohr says. "We provide the introduction to our community to get people here, as a gateway to come and stay, spend a day, live here, retire here, build a business here, work here."

In Smyth's experience at the Eclectic Shoppe, it's working. "People are recognizing that Wabash is here and what we have to offer," she says. "I can only imagine that as the city continues to grow and attract people from different areas, our business will also grow." ☺

WHY WE TROLLEY WITH TROLLEY NO.85!

If you ask Jennifer Long-Dillon, Visit Wabash County isn't your average, old school tourism bureau, focused only on answering phones and passing out brochures.

Instead, as Tourism Manager for the team, she says the group is dedicated to creating enriching programming for visitors of all ages. One way they do that is through the charming mahogany-trimmed Trolley No. 85, which offers a robust lineup of programming through monthly experiences, tours, and events.

Trolley No. 85 is a unique 34-passenger and ADA-compliant vehicle available for private and public tours, special event shuttle services, and more. It features bench-style seating, a politician's platform, and offers year-round tours of the area, showcasing Wabash County's attention to maintaining and spotlighting its historic architecture and its commitment to downtown revitalization.

Visit Wabash County Marketing Strategist Haley Renbarger says the mission of the organization is to serve as a leader in tourism and economic development, and to use creative marketing tactics to showcase the community. What better way to get a unique vantage point of the public murals, cute boutiques, charming antique shops, specialty lodging, and theaters, than Trolley No. 85?

Demand for the trolley is growing, too. After acquiring a used 22-passenger trolley in 2014, the County quickly outgrew the initial vehicle. In 2019, a partnership with the City of Wabash led to an investment in a new trolley. "We chose an American, female-owned company in Wisconsin to help us create a one-of-a-kind 'Visit Wabash County' Trolley No.85," Long-Dillon says. "After a year of designing and working with Hometown Trolley, No.85 was hand delivered to Wabash."

Long-Dillon says the trolley's beautiful condition is maintained via a partnership with the City of Wabash Street Department. Since 2019, the trolley has led passengers, both tourists and locals alike, on adventures to historic locations and iconic landmarks. "Trolley No. 85 runs free for festivals and First Friday celebrations within Wabash County," Renbarger says. "It's also available for private use, weddings, reunions, bachelorette parties, private guided tours and more. Each year, our tourism team creates a fresh lineup of guided tours, featuring everything from historic fun to family-friendly farm tours. There is always something for everyone."

A varied tour lineup each year means passengers get unique experiences each time.

"The focus is always around education and hands-on experiences," Long-Dillon says. "The tours range from historic homes and buildings to waterfall-chasing and eagle-watching. We offer historical tours of different towns throughout Wabash County as a way to share our story through cultural tourism."

Local nonprofits are also invited to book trolley tours, and are provided a discounted rate. Corporate events, special events, and private party reservations are also available. Long-Dillon says they frequently get requests from interested parties to create custom tours just for their group, which they are happy to do. 📍

HISTORIC LANDMARKS



1 - Hanging Rock

4552 E Hanging Rock Rd, Lagro

The Acres Land Trust property, located on the southern bank of the Wabash River, near the town of Lagro, contains an impressive natural exposure of fossilized coral reef dating from the Silurian Period some 400 million years ago. The limestone reef deposit rises 75 feet above the river and is being undercut by it, giving the site its "hanging" appearance.

2 - North Manchester Covered Bridge

S Mill St, North Manchester

The North Manchester Covered Bridge, constructed in 1872, is one of the two remaining covered bridges which span the Eel River in Wabash County, Indiana.

3 - Paradise Spring Historical Park

351 E Market St, Wabash, IN

Paved walkway through historic log cabins on the site where the Treaty at Paradise Spring was signed. Also was once a main hub for the Big Four Railroad.

4 - Roann Covered Bridge

SR 16 (North Side of Roann)

While there once were twenty-nine covered bridges in Wabash County, the Roann Covered bridge is now one of the only two remaining covered bridges in the county.

5 - St. Patrick's Catholic Church

940 Main St, Lagro, IN

Built in 1870 by Irish immigrants, this breathtaking church speaks for itself. Victorian Gothic style, the original bell and organ are still in use.

6 - Stockdale Mill

State Rd 16, Roann

The Stockdale Mill is a historic grist mill built between 1855 and 1857. The mill is powered by a 202 ft. long dam that spans the Eel River. Open Saturdays for FREE tours from 12pm to 4pm, come explore 3 and 1/2 stories of history!

7 - The Honeywell House

720 N Wabash St, Wabash

The Honeywell House, home of the late Mrs. Mark C. Honeywell, is a nonprofit cultural center owned and operated by the Honeywell Foundation.

8 - Thomas Marshall House

409 N Market St, North Manchester

Thomas R. Marshall was our Nation's 28th Vice President. Tour this historic home located in charming North Manchester, Indiana.

9 - Wabash-Erie Canal - Kerr Lock

Washington St, Lagro

There were four locks near Lagro. The Kerr Lock, the McDonald Lock, the Ditton Lock, and the Hayes Lock. They were named after their locktenders. Locktenders were the people that took care of the locks.

10 - Wabash County Courthouse & Abraham Lincoln Monument

2 S Wabash St, Wabash

First Electrically Lighted city in the World:

"From the towering dome of the Court House at 8 PM on March 31, 1880, burst a flood of lights that made world history."



LaFontaine Veterans' Memorial

103 W Branson St, LaFontaine

This memorial is a point of pride for the LaFontaine community. The memorial stone features an eagle, bomber planes, and soldiers in action. It reads: "Dedicated to all the men and women who have honorably and faithfully served in the Armed Forces of the United States of America". Insignias from all service branches and a POW/MIA insignia to honor those still unaccounted for, are featured at the base of the stone.

Urbanization has been the trend for the last century in the United States. For most of that time, living close to cities offered access and exposure to markets and opportunities unattainable to rural residents.

However, in today's connected world, small town living no longer represents isolation. In fact, small town living affords many benefits of urban life while ensuring access to what cities cannot: untouched nature, the affordability of living your values, proximity to the essentials, encouraging entrepreneurial prospects, and close-knit communities that care for each other. And the list doesn't end there.

We spoke with four hard-working, small-town residents to hear their perspectives on what makes micropolitan living so special.

Andrew Chinworth was born in Pennsylvania and moved to North Manchester when he was eight years-old. Now at thirty-three, he considers himself a local. Chinworth is a science teacher at Manchester High School (his alma mater) teaching Physics, sustainable energy alternatives, eighth-grade general science, and coaching the golf and Science Olympiad teams.

Growing up, Chinworth dreamed of leaving North Manchester to start a life in a big city. After living and working in Portland, Washington D.C., and New York City, he realized just how special North Manchester and its residents are.

"My favorite part about this community is certainly the people, both those I've known since I was a kid and those I'm getting to know through working at the school," he said. "This is the town that raised me, and I had a pretty good childhood and education because of the people who [live] and work here."

Chinworth has heard his fair share of misconceptions about small town living. One of the things he values most, especially when compared to his time living elsewhere, is the access to the outdoors. "I think rural Indiana is a really beautiful place," he said. "If you have any level of curiosity about the natural world, you never have to be bored here," he said. "A walk in the woods in any season can be really amazing." Chinworth takes advantage of the serenity available outside his front door, which can often be unattainable in urban environments.

Those natural surroundings also produce some of the best local crops. "The best chefs from Fort Wayne and Indianapolis all want what is growing right here 'in the middle of nowhere,'" he said. "I've traveled all over the world and been lucky enough to eat at some really amazing places, but none of them were any better than the food prepared with what comes out of the ground here." And while prices climb higher and faster in urban settings, small towns consistently keep their costs reasonable, allowing those special meals out to be more regular than a rare treat.

Living in North Manchester has allowed Chinworth to focus on environmental issues important to him. In 2017, after renting for a year, he started looking to buy property. He found wooded acreage in Lagro and built a small, 'off-the-grid' house, which runs on solar power and batteries as a more sustainable approach to energy consumption. By choosing micropolitan Indiana as his homebase, Chinworth can afford to live his values at every turn without compromising on a full, rich life.

For Chinworth's partner, Addison Neher, Northeast Indiana made the perfect setting for a new Montessori School at the Wabash Presbyterian Church. Many of the families live close enough to walk or bike to school. "We love our access to surrounding businesses and public resources," Neher said. "We take frequent walking field trips to the library, Charley Creek Gardens (Honeywell), and the [County] museum."

In 2022, the Montessori School expanded to include the Farm School at Joyfield Farms in North Manchester. The intentional living community focuses on sustainable living with four families living on the property. "We consider the residents our experts and invite them to join us for meals," Neher said.

It's the unique farm stores in North Manchester that make the area especially enjoyable for Neher. "I frequent the farmers market, Hawkins Family Farm, and River Ridge Farm. I also love knowing the owners of the businesses I patronize. It makes me feel like a seen member of the community."

Just a stone's throw away, Chinworth and Neher can catch nationally-touring musicians, comedians, and performers visiting nearby performing arts venues, offering music, stand-up, and movies, including The Honeywell Center and Foundation, Eagles Theatre, and the 13-24 Drive-In. If a night on the town isn't in the cards, they also enjoy evenings with friends, family, and neighbors nearby—adding a strong sense of connectedness that only a tight-knit community can foster.

"There is value in living in a small [town]," Chinworth said. When he's not teaching, he's making music, golfing, gardening, and hiking. "Any time spent in a rural place is best spent outside," Chinworth said. "There are a ton of really great preserves in the area, just check out Acres Land Trust. The Eel River is a great river for canoeing, and Manchester now has a canoe rental business." Chinworth hopes more people consider rural Indiana for more than a quick trip, perhaps as a comfortable and affordable new home.

For 31-year-old Neil Bever, Wabash County runs through his blood. His family has been in the area since the late 1800s. Bever went to high school locally and attended college in-state. After attending chiropractic school in Minnesota, he moved back to Roann, married his wife Raelyn, had two children, and opened a chiropractic office locally.

"Roann is a very small town—not even a stoplight," Bever said. "I absolutely fell in love with Roann. It's [the type of] community that people think is gone at this point. The idea that when you take a walk, everyone is on their front porch, waving at you; [it] really feels like 'the American dream' still."

Part of that American dream includes being your own boss, and fostering an entrepreneurial spirit runs in the Bever family. As a stay-at-home mother of two, Raelyn Bever taught herself how to solder and make jewelry from YouTube tutorials.

"I make memorial jewelry with cremains, breast milk, funeral and wedding flowers, and many other things," Raelyn said. She was inspired to make keepsake jewelry after watching her mother receive a necklace, made from her grandmother's ashes.

Starting a business in a town like Roann means less competition and less saturation within the market. For Raelyn, her small community provides a large dose of support for her personal and unique jewelry business. "The great thing about starting a small business in a small community is how supportive everyone has been of me," she said. "People are happy to help you grow and succeed." Small towns embrace new ventures and opportunities excitedly, and business-owners like Raelyn have the ideal conditions to expand their careers while achieving work-life balance.

Another perk Raelyn loves about basing her business in Roann is the proximity to the post office. It's within walking distance from her home. "I make daily trips there, and having a close relationship with my postal worker is very nice," she said. Local support means everything to the entrepreneur, but the ability to ship worldwide means the bounds of her customer base are endless.

One of the Bever family's favorite local attractions is the covered bridge. It's an especially familiar spot for Raelyn, whose little brother was born in a house very close to the landmark.

Tourist attractions like the covered bridge bring visitors, but Neil Bever said there's still a lot to offer for locals alike. "We get a lot of people kayaking or floating on tubes down the river. There's a lot to do in Roann. I think people would be surprised by how busy we keep in such a small town," he said.

One of the most notable events is the annual Roann Covered Bridge Festival, another favorite within the Bever family. "Being able to walk from your house and get an elephant ear...that's as good as life gets," he laughed. Even his young daughter anticipates the four-day festival and asks about it for months leading up to the event, which takes place the weekend after Labor Day.

"I would put our festival up against any town's festival. We always get a lot of good vendors and food trucks. Truck-and-tractor pulls bring a ton of people in. There's a lot for everybody to see," Bever said.

Roann is the perfect place to raise a family, said Bever. "It's a very family-centric community, where there are generations of families living in Roann. On Sundays, people get together with their kids and grandkids."

When neighbors know each other, there's an added level of security within the community, said Bever. "It's a good thing to know that people are looking out for you, and keeping an eye on things to make sure you're safe and protected. The people in Roann really care about [the community]," he said.

Bever would love to see more people choose Roann as a homebase for their families and businesses alike. "We'd like to see more people coming into the area, what they can bring into our community, and how they can enhance it for everybody." 🍷



EDUCATION & CHOICES ABOUND

Whether you're just starting your family, relocating your kids to a new town, or looking to switch districts, finding the right fit for your child's education can feel overwhelming. There are many different types of educational approaches to pick from, and each has its strengths.

Private schools may have smaller class sizes. Public schools may provide more diverse offerings. These days, technology provides more opportunity to teach with varying modes of instruction.

Some programs excel at the critical thinking and experimental realms of science and engineering, while other programs allow students complete immersion into language learning and prepare them for intercultural dialogue.



It can be hard to keep up as a parent to the developing trends in education and know what's right for your family's needs and your child's learning style. Learning, after all, is not one-size-fits-all.

Wabash County is home to many school districts, career centers, and private educational institutions that are as diverse and unique as each child. They each offer a wide variety of opportunities for their students, but each stands out for something special they bring to the table. Here are some of Wabash County's schooling options with a nod to what sets them apart. Dive deep to discover the vast offerings of each school to find the right match for you!

WABASH CITY SCHOOLS - 260-563-2151

Priding themselves on building a legacy of opportunity for all, Wabash City Schools aims to provide a relevant and rigorous education for its roughly 1500 students. These 21st century learning environments weave iPad technology into the curriculum to ensure students are both college and career-ready. From preschool to fifth grade, a Spanish Dual Language Immersion program offers students the rare and valuable chance to learn another language with great fluency.



Four schools make up this district: L.H. Carpenter Early Learning Center (preschool and kindergarten), O.J. Neighbours Elementary (grades 1-4), Wabash Middle School (grades 5-8), and Wabash High School (grades 9-12).

Wabash High School (WHS) is an Early College High School, providing students a chance to graduate with thirty hours of general education credit transfer to public Indiana colleges and universities. Whether through dual credits or rigorous Advanced Placement courses, families can save thousands of dollars by taking advantage of this opportunity to challenge themselves early.



METROPOLITAN SCHOOL DISTRICT - 260-563-8050

Metropolitan School District (MSD) offers unique opportunities allowing parents and students to discover and achieve their potential and passions. Among many other social and academic offerings, MSD upper schools provide PSAT/SAT testing, Advanced Placement and Dual Credit classes, and even professional internships that allow seniors to receive workforce experience during half their school day.

Six schools make up the Metropolitan School District, including: Metro North Elementary (age 3 - grade 2), Southwood Elementary (preschool - grade 5), Sharp Creek Elementary (grades 3-6), White's Jr./Sr. High, Northfield Jr./Sr. High (grades 7-12) and Southwood Jr./Sr. High (grades 6-12).

In addition, MSD has a Wabash-Miami Area Program supporting students with disabilities across five school districts as well as The Bridge Program for recovery credits to earn diplomas (grades 7-12). The online-based program uses individualized plans and fully licensed teachers to assist students in making their graduation dreams a reality.

MANCHESTER COMMUNITY SCHOOLS - 260-982-7518

Manchester Community Schools (MCS) is a STEM-certified district, offering Robotics and Science Olympiad for students grades 4-12. They're also one of just fifty-seven teams across the country to be selected by NASA TechRise for the Suborbital Experiment. Among many other programs and features, they also offer Dual Language Immersion and a German Exchange Program, provide a student-run store and coffee shop, and provide locally-grown and raised food options in school lunches.

Three schools make up the Manchester Community Schools, including: Manchester Elementary (pre-kindergarten - grade 3), Manchester Intermediate (grades 4-6), and Manchester Jr./Sr. High (grades 7-12), serving nearly 1400 students.

THE MONTESSORI SCHOOL AT WABASH PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH - 260-563-8881

The Montessori School provides a student-centered, observation-based approach that values the natural curiosity and motivation of children to learn. Education here aims to prepare the student's body, mind, and spirit for the future, prioritizing movement and practical skills that empower the learner. Classrooms are multi-age, allowing older children to take on leadership roles with younger students. Screens are rarely used in classrooms at The Montessori School.

Also providing a Montessori-style education is the Forest School at Asherwood Nature Preserve. Three mornings a week, students explore hiking trails, learn about animals and plants, and spend hours outside, rain or shine. This non-traditional educational environment promotes self-assuredness and discovery in its young students who will quickly nurture a love of the outdoors.



SAINT BERNARD CATHOLIC CHURCH - 260-563-5746

Saint Bernard School offers a Christian-based education that strives to form the whole person, morally, spiritually, and academically. They use a blended learning approach, which utilizes traditional instruction, technology, and guided or independent practice to engage students who also benefit from small class sizes. Part of the Fort Wayne/South Bend diocese, Saint Bernard provides Religion Class and Mass to its students within a rigorous curriculum that also includes opportunities to study Spanish, STEM, and even Robotics. An emphasis on community creates a supportive environment in which older students mentor and model for younger students in a meaningful exchange.





WESLEY ACADEMY AT WABASH FIRST UNITED METHODIST CHURCH - 260-563-7665

Wesley Academy provides a Christ-centered learning environment with small class sizes for individualized attention. There are both morning and afternoon sessions for preschool (ages 3-4) and Pre-Kindergarten (ages 4-5), and toddlers ages 2.5 to 3 can attend morning sessions of Bright Beginnings to build skills for later success in the classroom. In these early childhood programs, students develop social skill development, large and fine motor skills, communication skills, and reasoning. Educational field trips provide children a chance to apply their skills and sense of wonder in a new setting.

McKillip Machinery was established in May of 2018, with a lot of support from the community, family, and friends. The McKillip's definitely want everyone to know that it took a lot of praying, talking, and thinking to decide to start their own business. Brent has no hesitation to say that it was Keishia's idea. Keishia was a stay-at-home mom, but knowing her husband's happiness of doing what he loves to do was more important to her, Keishia put everything aside and came up with McKillip Machinery as the business name.

Brent found a location for the new business and they started buying and selling equipment.

Starting on 4 acres on the north side of US 24 in Wabash, it included a 16 x 24 cabin as the office. In the first two days of operations, McKillip Machinery started with six pieces of equipment. By the end of the first 60 days, there were 17 gravity wagons and 38 total pieces sitting on the lot. The wagons have always been a running joke with them in this business; when one rolls out then three more will come.

By the end of the second year in business, Brent and Keishia were working together every day. Just the two of them ran the office and loaded and unload equipment. It became very busy, very quickly and by the beginning of the third year they had both discussed about how they should expand the business. However, another opportunity came along and they purchased the building up the road from their original location.



They have had their highs and lows but with that has come great opportunities to grow in less than 4 years. Now McKillip Machinery sits on nearly 9 acres of farm equipment right along highway 24. They are definitely fortunate to have built the business into what it is today. Those at McKillip Machinery hope to be around for many years to serve the Wabash community and agricultural community across the nation.

3 MUST-SEE HISTORIC HOME RENOS IN WABASH COUNTY: HIDDEN PASSAGES, A 170+ YEAR-OLD BARN, & MORE!

Revitalizing historic properties and bringing new life to communities is a concept captured in many popular TV shows. Viewers often enjoy the before and afters, the obstacles, the surprising finds, and the stories of homeowners brave enough to attempt projects.

But you don't have to watch HGTV or Netflix to experience amazing home renovations. Across Northeast Indiana, many residents are taking the opportunity to restore historic homes and make homes out of other buildings, from schoolhouses to centuries-old barns.

Paul Hayden, Director of the Indiana Landmarks Northeast Field Office, says it is no surprise a renaissance of home renovation is happening in Wabash County. For years, the community has had an increased demand for quality housing, which Mayor Scott Long attributes in part to people migrating to the area for the quality of life it can provide. This translates to the opportunity to rethink and add value to the existing housing stock.

Indiana Landmarks, a nonprofit organization committed to restoration, has been a partner in the process of renovating many historic Wabash spaces, saving them from demolition, fixing up exteriors, and helping owners envision possibilities.

Hayden says this work is important, not just for preserving history and craftsmanship, but also for strengthening Northeast Indiana's economy. Home restoration and strong housing stock contribute to a community's vitality and send a powerful message of care and investment in smaller, rural towns.

"In a community, like Wabash, a vast majority of homes are historic," says Hayden. "We need to value the history that's here. When you have a town with a beautiful collection of houses consistent from one end of town to the other, it reads well."

208 W HILL STREET, WABASH OWNERS: KRISTI AND BILL RAUH (BR) BOUGHT HOUSE IN 2021

BR: Our house was built in 1874, and it is considered a Second Empire home. I was born and raised in Wabash and went to school with the kids who lived here; my wife has always loved this home. We looked at buying it in 2020 but decided against it due to the condition it was in. But we looked again in 2021 and decided to buy it as is. We took out 18 dumpsters worth of stuff; the roof leaked; there was no central air; the whole house had to be rewired and re-plumbed. My wife's ability to see this house amazes me. It is so cool now to just go sit in a room and look around at the crown molding, the chandelier, and the woodwork.

IFW: What renovations did you make?

BR: The roof had leaked, and it was a slate roof originally, so we found a rubber synthetic polyester roof that repeats the pattern and looks of the original. We carried that down through the outside of the house and painted the windows and downspouts to match the roof. We painted the brick, and we were able to keep the neat corbels and dentils by finding new ones similar in style to replace some. Our contractor was able to fit in the replacements to make it look original. There was nothing nice in the house, very barebones. There was not a functional bathroom when we purchased it.

IFW: Were there any surprises during the renovation?

BR: While we were renovating one bathroom, we did find a hidden passage. It was blocked off, and we discovered it and decided to keep it. It's in the kitchen, and it looks like a kitchen cabinet or closet, but it connects to the new full bathroom.

IFW: What advice would you give others about the renovation process?

BR: Don't be afraid to help. Get your hands dirty. That made it so much better for us, as we could help direct the contractor, but it is physically exhausting. Even though we had a contractor, we had work to do every day to make sure everything was ready for the guys so they could work. It's also financially a lot. Nothing is cheap, so people doing something similar should be prepared. There was also a lot of frustration over supply delays. Plan ahead due to supply issues, and store stuff if you need to. We had to wait a year for a refrigerator.

Now it's a pure treat to live in. It's paradise. I was born and raised here, and Wabash has been very good to me. I couldn't think of a better place to live. I'm a big history guy; we learn things from our history, and it's important for everything, so it's such a treat to come into the house each day.

LAFONTAINE, IN OWNERS: MERLIN AND JANE HARPER RIDGEWAY (JHR) BOUGHT HOUSE IN 1996

JHR: I grew up in LaFontaine near this homestead property that my great-grandparents once owned (1878-1920). It is one of the earliest and most historic in Wabash County. The early brick house is still standing today.

It was originally a two-room log cabin built around 1835 and rumored to be part of the Underground Railroad. My father and his four siblings were born in the brick house and were raised in the smaller "tenant's house" built next door. The property was sold after my great-grandfather's death and was owned for many years by one of my great-grandmother's nephews and his family. My husband and I were able to purchase the remaining homestead acreage, both houses and the barns from the estate in 1996. I

remember many stories told by my father and his siblings growing up on this property and playing in the big barns where their grandfather once raised Blooded Short-Horns, as well as hogs and a few thoroughbred cows.

IFW: What renovations did you make?

JHR: We remodeled the original house in 1998 and lived in it for several years. It was important to us to keep the original historic look of the home as we updated and built an addition. My husband used the barns mainly as shops and equipment storage for his construction business. He also enjoyed raising goats, sheep, and chickens for several years. Our grandchildren, visiting friends, and family always enjoyed a trip to his "petting zoo" and adventures in the woods on the four-wheeler, mowers, or his antique tractors. In 2003, we decided we would both like to renovate the large barn for our home and started looking at other barn homes for ideas and possibilities. Our young grandchildren thought we would simply be moving into the barn "as is" and live with the goats and chickens! Even some of our adult family and friends thought we may have lost our minds, but we had a vision and a desire, and we both loved the challenge of the project.

IFW: What have been your biggest challenges and rewards in the process?

JHR: As with our historic brick house, the biggest challenge for our barn was wanting to keep most of the original look while updating it for our needs and comforts. We kept most of the original barn window sizes on the front of the barn while allowing more light and openness by installing large window walls and French doors across the lower and upper levels on the back. Our main living area is on the second floor and a deck on the upper level gives us a wonderful view of our woods and surrounding vistas.

Another architectural feature of the barn we love is the original wood shake ceilings and exposed beams in the barn. Since we needed to insulate it for a home, we had foam insulation sprayed on the roof and installed metal roofing over the insulation that preserved the natural look we love inside.

IFW: Do you have any advice for anyone interested in historical renovations?

JHR: It is important to know the strengths and weaknesses of any structure you may want to renovate. If you are not experienced in construction, you should get professional advice before you start. Understand your own physical and financial limitations and expect to work hard or your dream could be a nightmare. We were blessed to have a 170+-year-old barn in extremely good condition. It had a good foundation and was a square and firm structure with walls that had been protected by a good roof. If you can, follow the desires of your heart. Our barn home has been a true labor of love for us. ☺

PUCKERBRUSH SCHOOLHOUSE, WABASH OWNER: JENNIFER LONG-DILLON (JLD) BOUGHT HOUSE IN 2005

IFW: Tell us about your home and how you decided to renovate it.

JLD: I bought the schoolhouse when I was 22 years old. I went, looked, and fell in love with its potential. It was about to go to auction, and I purchased it in a quick sale in "as-is condition" in one week. The house most likely would have been torn down and used as farmland.

Puckerbrush Schoolhouse was built in 1892 for area school kids and used as a one-room school for about 25 years. It was named after the berries that grew in the area; when you take a bite, they

make your lips pucker. Still to this day those same berries grow on the property and cause the same reaction. I love the area that the schoolhouse is in. It is a beautiful piece of land. As a local history buff, I love the rich history of Wabash County, and owning a little piece of it is so fun! Preservation in any county is incredibly important. Saving our history for future generations is necessary for towns of our size to stay alive and create a safe place to raise a family.

IFW: What renovations did you make?

JLD: It took my family and me three months to get it to where it was livable for me to move in. Windows were missing and the floor was sunken in spots. My dad, brothers, and I re-plumbed and rewired it, put new windows in, and fixed the floor joists. As I lived in it, I continued to work on it. Refinishing the wood floors, tuckpointing the brick, refacing the kitchen cabinets, gutting the bathroom twice, massive landscaping treatment, insulating, and building built-in shelves and cabinets all through the house. I tried to keep anything original to the house; however, I needed it to be my home and not a schoolhouse. I would call it more of a cottage style now. I had a vision for it when I first saw it; over many years we made that vision happen. I couldn't be happier that I was able to save something so unique and beautiful to enjoy for many more years.

IFW: What historical aspects have you preserved and why?

JLD: All the brick on the outside was preserved, and I exposed the brick on the inside of the house as well. It has original hardwood floors that we sanded and refinished. We tore out a wall to expose the inside brick, and when we did this, we found an original wood window. I took the window out and now I have it as part of the decor on the walls of the house. There are also many names scratched into the outside brick; I assume it was the names of the children that went to the school.

IFW: What advice do you have for others considering renovating a historic space?

JLD: Figuring out how to do things. I have learned SO much about taking care of an old home and finding beauty in everything. My advice is: Don't think too much and just go for it. The adventure is fun, and the blood, sweat, and tears are worth it in the end. You will look back and thank yourself for believing.

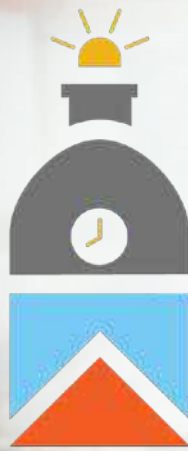

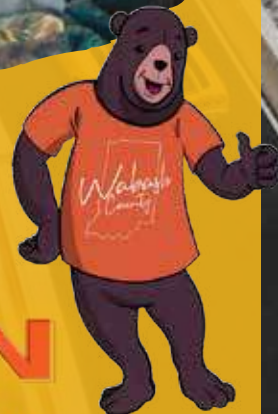
